The Principal's Comments

Abridged version of Prizegiving Speech.

At last year's prizegiving, I chose not to follow the usual principal's speech format. Instead of listing our school's achievements, I let our students - those coming up to receive awards - speak for themselves through their actions. Of course, Morrinsville College is in a strong position across all the traditional indicators: academic achievement, attendance, property, finances, enrolment, and staffing. We've had to turn away out-of-zone students, and we're on track for some of our best academic results ever. I'm confident that whoever takes over from me will inherit a school with solid foundations.

These metrics, while important, don't capture the true essence of our school. The heartbeat of Morrinsville College lies in things that can't be measured - things that are lived, felt, and experienced. You won't find it in media debates about education, in statistics, or in social media commentary. You'll find it in the spirit of service that runs through our school.

I sat in our service assembly and watched 200 students receive awards for their contributions to our school and community. Some were recognised for a single act, others for ten or more. It reaffirmed what I've long believed: service is the core of our school's identity. It's embedded in our motto - "Be of service to others and honest to thyself." Service teaches leadership, empathy, humility, and teamwork. It connects people and builds purpose. We see students supporting younger peers in feeder schools and engaging with the wider community. And it's not just students - our staff go above and beyond every day, often outside their job descriptions.

I want to acknowledge our staff for their quiet, consistent acts of care. Whether it's running extracurriculars or showing up at sunrise to share breakfast with Year 13s on their last day, they make space for the small conversations that tell our students they matter. These moments aren't in any job description, but they are the soul of our school.

This spirit of service extends beyond our gates. In a rural community, a school doesn't stand alone. Many people have served our kura - as coaches, managers, drivers, mentors, or gateway employers. I want to thank various businesses and community groups, including but not limited to The Morrinsville Lions Club, Rotary, The Perry Outdoor Education Trust, the police, Kiwanis, and MBS - for their ongoing support.

Service has also been central to the Morrinsville Kahui Ako, which concludes this year. I want to acknowledge Ngahu Potaka's leadership and the collective achievements of our local schools. I know Jenny Clarke, Principle of Morrinsville Intermediate School, would join me in that recognition.

I told our students at the service awards that it's my favourite prizegiving. I'm not sure they believed me, but I meant it. As I wrote it with my PA, Grace Martin, I was struck by the fact that Grace has worked with three principals over five decades, before personal computers and AI. She recently turned 75. That is the definition of service.

Our Kuia, Te Ao Marama Maka's service, too, is immeasurable. Now, I'm far too scared to guess her age publicly, but I will say this: she has served our kura and surrounding schools since the 1980s, when she first joined our Board of Trustees. That, too, is the epitome of service.

It's fitting to acknowledge our current board Members' contributions. Some no longer have children at Morrinsville College, yet they continue to give their time, energy, and wisdom to support our students and help guide me as principal. Their commitment is deeply appreciated.

Every year at Senior Prizegiving, we present two service awards that may not carry the same spotlight as Head Student or Dux, but in many ways, they are just as significant. If you're looking for a true indicator of future success, it's right there. No pressure to the recipients, but these awards reflect the values that sit at the heart of our school.

From our youngest students to our longest-serving community members, the spirit of service is what binds us. It's what makes Morrinsville College more than just a place of learning - it makes it a community.

To our students and award winners: you represent excellence and endeavour. You've invested countless hours in study and shown a commitment to growth that your teachers and peers have recognised. These awards are not just acknowledgements of what you've done - they are affirmations of who you are becoming. Discipline, curiosity, and a willingness to learn are qualities that will serve you well in life.

Looking ahead, I'm confident that Morrinsville College will continue to build on its strong traditions while embracing innovation and creating new opportunities for our students. We will keep nurturing the true heart of our school - its people - and the transformative power of learning.

So, I close by acknowledging everyone connected to Morrinsville College. Whether you're a student, staff member, parent, board member, or community supporter - thank you. Together, we make opportunity possible. Together, we share in the success of our kura.

Steve is the author and illustrator of Ultrawild, a book which recently won the Best Children's Non-Fiction Book at the Australian Book Awards and the 2024 Elsie Locke Award for Non-Fiction in New Zealand 2024.

Steve spoke to our senior students about the philosophy behind his book and asked them to draw and share their own thoughts and amazing designs. His passion lies in exploring ways in which generations, especially younger people, can reimagine the world they live in, and he describes his book as "science-comedy to kickstart creative thinking". The workshop was amazing, and our students adored his quirky ideas. Afterwards, Steve told me that he loved our students and their enthusiasm.

The library holds a book club once a week where interested students can come and discuss books, movies, and hot topics. We know they attend to connect with other like-minded students rather than just eat the biscuits! Ms Dwyer also attends these stimulating literary discussions.

With the ban on cellphones during school hours, the library has become a much calmer place. To have normal chatter at break times rather than silence with heads hanging over cell phones has been a winner this year. Students are communicating and reading books.

The Mirror is Never Empty by Morgan Jubber

I - The mirror waits. It does not call, or beckon, or breathe. But it is always there, Flat, thin, silver-throated. Its voice is quiet-But never silent. I look in, And something looks back. Not me exactly. Not me A version. A shell. A suggestion. Held still like a held breath.

II - The mirror lies. I've heard that before. But it doesn't lie. It only shows what is placed before it. It's the eyes that do the twisting. The mind that does the warping. We bring our own knives And carve away at what we see. Until something acceptable remains. Or nothing.

III - In my grandmother's house, There was a mirror above the hallway table. It was chipped in the corner, Where her husband had thrown keys Harder than necessary. Each morning, she would stand before it, Lipstick precise, Necklace clasped just so. A ritual of repair. She said, "We must look together, Even when we are not." I think she meant Putting the pieces back Where the cracks wouldn't show.

IV - A mirror is a memory That refuses to grow old. It holds you The way you once were Before grief touched your hair, Before you started hiding parts of yourself In clothes, in silence, In the blur of bathroom steam. It reminds you of what has passed— But also of what you are becoming.

V - In glass, I have been all things: The shy child behind the curtains, The teenage girl picking herself apart, The boy rehearsing his courage in the dark, The grown-up pretending they know What they're doing with their life. The mirror had held them all. Not kindly, But without judgment. Which is almost the same thing.



VI - Some mirrors are not made of glass. A phone screen. A puddle on the street. The glossy eyes of a friend When they see you and know You are not okay. Reflection is not only light. It is recognition. It is the moment someone says "I see you," And means it.

VII - There are mirrors in hospitals. Above sinks. On metal carts. In rooms where people lose their hair, Their limbs, Their sense of direction. One man, I remember, Asked the nurse to cover his mirror. He didn't want to see What the sickness had done. His eyes had become strangers. The glass was a gate he refused to walk through. But even a covered mirror Still remembers your face.

VIII - In dressing rooms, We twist in front of them, Pull at fabric, Compare ourselves to people We have never met But are told to resemble. The mirror becomes a battleground For acceptance. A war we wage against skin, Against belly, Against shoulders that were made To carry so much more Than judgment.

IX - I once smashed a mirror. Not out of rage. Out of desperation. To see if breaking it Would stop the reflection. It didn't. The shards just made more versions of me. XV - The mirror is not magic. Fragmented, Repeating, Endless. Each sliver screamed: "Here you are. And here. And here."

X - There are cultures that cover mirrors During mourning. As if the dead might get trapped, Or the grieving might see Too much of their own emptiness. I think they are justified in being cautious. Mirrors hold more Than just faces. They hold thresholds.

As if I could never be free

From myself.

XI - The mirror watches. Not because it is alive, But because it makes you aware That you are. You walk past it, And feel yourself walking. You adjust a collar, Straighten your shoulders. Not for comfort But for coherence. To match the idea Of how a person should appear When seen.

XII - There are mirrors in funhouses That distort your shape, Make you thin, Wide, Long, Wrong. They are not so different From the ones on our walls. Only more honest In their dishonesty. They never pretend To tell the truth.

XIII - Some days, I avoid the mirror. Its stillness Accuses me Of motionlessness. Of becoming Too much or too little Of what I hoped for. Other days, I look for too long, Waiting For the reflection to blink first. It never does.

XIV - When you fall in love, The mirror becomes softer. Or maybe your gaze does. You begin to notice things That aren't flaws. You begin to smile Without checking If your teeth are straight. You see what someone else sees. And for a moment, You agree with them.

But it can be a spell. One that reveals, Undoes, Rebuilds. Each time you stand before it, You conjure Your own becoming. You decide what to see. And what to refuse.

XVI - And when you are gone, When no one is left to cast a reflection, The mirror will remain Silent, Unbroken, Faithful. Waiting for the next face To ask a question Without words. And to listen To an answer It will never speak aloud.

Mathematics

2025 was another year of learning and growth for our students in the mathematics department. An important focus for our Year 10s has been preparing them for the Numeracy CAA, in addition to learning foundational skills to prepare them for the new NCEA Level 1 standards. Our senior students showed a lot of positivity and enthusiasm for their internal assessments early in the year, and many of them experienced a lot of success. The external assessments are always a daunting challenge, and we wish our students all the best when they attempt them in November. We have regularly offered lunchtime tutorials to give extra time to those students who are committed to gaining the best possible results, and we look forward to seeing the fruit of their efforts.

Outside of the classroom, we have continued to provide opportunities for our students to become involved in Mathematics competitions. This included offering our own Junior Maths Competition in Term 1, in which 16 students participated. Rakaunui O'Brien, Strickland Lucas Belmar, and Harbir Singh each won a \$50 Warehouse voucher. Last year was the first time we offered this competition, and we intend to make it an annual event.

In Term 2, we offered the Kiwi Maths Competition, run by Canterbury University. Four of our Year 9 students participated. Our top student was Harbir Singh, who gained an Excellence grade. In Term 3, Mr Kemp worked closely with teachers from Te Aroha College and Matamata College to organise the first-ever Pāngarau ā-Piako Mathematics Competition. Teams from the three schools faced off against each other in a great evening of problem-solving, with our Year 9 and Year 11 teams each taking away a trophy. Matamata College will host the competition next year, and we hope to include more schools in the event.

Finally, our top-performing junior students represented our school in the annual WaiMaths competition, this year held at Hamilton Boys' High School. Our Year 9 team was placed third in their category, which is the highest placing our school has had in all of my time at the college.

Special thanks must go to Mr Kemp for all of his hard work providing training for our budding mathematicians and for organising Pāngarau ā-Piako.



Science

We have had another great year in the Science Learning Area at Morrinsville College. We enjoyed some amazing trips. Year 13 Biology had a very successful camp at Tongariro National Park, with a significant number completing the full crossing. Our Year 12 Biology classes highly enjoyed their trip to Ōtūmoetai Beach and the tour of the University of Waikato Coastal Marine Field Station. The senior Chemistry students had a blast at the University of Waikato ChemQuest Quiz and Analytical Chemistry competition. Our Year 11 Science classes enjoyed spending the afternoon at the Morrinsville River Walk, studying the health of our local awa. Finally, a group of Year 10 students loved the hands-on experience in the Waikato University lab. Huge thanks to the PTC Trust for making this possible. In class, our students have worked hard and enjoyed a range of exciting experiments this year. We are proud of the progress that all our students have made.

2025 was an extremely exciting year for EPro8. We saw record numbers of students participating in EPro8 this year, with four teams of Juniors and three teams of Seniors competing at the regional competition. For some students, it was their first time and very much out of their comfort zone, but they did so well. We even had Year 13s involved for the first time; notably, Rita Bhandari, who had been trying to do EPro8 since Year 5. She finally lived out her primary school dreams! On the other hand, for some of our Year 11 and 12 boys, this was their 7th or 8th year attending. We were extremely proud of the two teams that made it into the semi & grand finals: our Year 10 team, the "Super Circuits," and our Year 11/12 team, "The Indecisives". It was awesome to see so many students putting themselves out there this year. If you are eager to try something different, enjoy problem-solving, and working as a team, consider joining next year. A huge thank you to the Board of Trustees for helping us purchase EPro8 gear over the past few years. This has helped our students prepare. Thanks also to Tatua Dairy Company, as their funding allows the teams that make it to the semi and grand finals, to attend at no cost.

Social Sciences

This has been a year of curiosity, exploration, and challenging ideas across the Social Science learning area. From Social Studies to Tourism, Accounting to Agribusiness, our students have embraced opportunities to think critically about the world around them. Field trips brought learning to life. Year 13 Geographers undertook their annual expedition to the Tongariro Volcanic Centre, exploring the dynamic processes shaping our land. Year 11 students travelled to Waihi to investigate gold mining and its environmental impacts, while both Year 11 and 13 Historians retraced the significant sites of the Waikato Wars, connecting directly with our shared history. These journeys provided more than knowledge; they gave students the chance to walk in the footsteps of others and reflect on how the past continues to shape our future. Our students have also been engaged with global issues.

A team represented the school at the Waikato Model UN Summit, debating the urgent problem of e-waste. Over two days, they developed critical problem-solving skills, tested their ability to negotiate, and offered practical solutions for a sustainable future.

Our Enviro Club has continued its important work at school, showing that environmental stewardship begins at home. In classrooms, subjects such as Economics, Commerce, and Financial Literacy challenged students to think about resilience in times of global uncertainty. History and Classical Studies encouraged empathy for the struggles of others and provided insights into the fight for human rights, while Social Studies placed an emphasis on civics and our role as active citizens in a rapidly changing world. Geography and Tourism kept students looking outward, connecting natural landscapes, culture, and the pressures of global events such as climate change and humanitarian crises.

The global headlines of 2025 have reminded us of the value of these subjects. Whether considering the economic impacts of international conflict, the realities of displaced communities, or the urgent calls for environmental action, our students have shown that being curious, involved, and willing to challenge ideas matters. They are learning that real change begins with awareness, empathy, and the courage to contribute solutions.

As one student reflected, "Social Sciences help us understand not just where we are, but who we are - and who we want to become."

Home Economics

My journey in Food Technology and Home Economics has been one of the most rewarding parts of my time at school. In Year 9, the subject focused on learning the basics, how to measure ingredients, follow recipes, and practice safety in a kitchen setting. Now, in Year 13, the subject has grown into so much more than just cooking and baking. I have learned to design, plan, and evaluate meals with real purpose, developing independence and creativity that I never imagined I would have when I first started.

In mid 2023, I took my passion for food outside the classroom and started my own cake business. This was the beginning of bringing my love for baking to life in a real world setting. The skills I had developed through Home Economics gave me the confidence to experiment, decorate, and deliver cakes that not only looked great but also met the needs of many different customers. Running my own at-home business has been one of the highlights of my Home Economics and Food Technology journey.

College Cuisine, our in-school restaurant, was another experience that showed me how far I had come. This year, instead of working in a big group, I worked with one other student to manage our event. Together, we served 20 guests with a full three-course meal, offering 10 separate food options. This assessment was definitely one of my favourites throughout Years 12 and 13, although it challenged every aspect of my ability, from management and organisation to teamwork and problem-solving. It was stressful but also one of the most rewarding opportunities, as it gave us a chance to bring our creativity to life.

Looking back, the difference between Year 9 and Year 13 is massive. In Year 9, I was still learning how to chop vegetables correctly and follow instructions step by step. By Year 13, I am creating my own products, designing menus that take into account nutrition and sustainability, and running events and a business outside of school. Home Economics has not only developed my technical skills in the kitchen but also life skills such as resilience, organisation, and creativity.

I am extremely grateful to the staff in the Food Technology and Home Economics Learning Area for the support and guidance I have received throughout the years. The experience I have had in Home Economics will stay with me well beyond school.



Electronics and Design

Juniors:

Year 9 students actively engaged in hands-on electronics projects, crafting copper tape circuits and assembling Future Kit Sets that included LED flashers, voice-activated LEDs, and moisture sensors. They explored virtual circuit design using TinkerCad and integrated Redstone circuits within Minecraft Education to enhance their sustainable house models. Working collaboratively, they developed eco-friendly solutions featuring solar panels, wind turbines, and vegetable gardens. Year 9 students also showcased their creativity by designing modern buildings using both Minecraft Education, freehand sketching, and SketchUp Pro.

Year 10 students explored a chosen Design Era, researching two influential designers and analysing their impact. They applied key design principles to projects, adapting classic ideas through experimentation and refinement. Outcomes included Minecraft Education builds, SketchUp models, and technical drawings. Students also designed a Jurassic Park museum in Minecraft and developed a

creative fiction story featuring Minecraft characters.

Seniors:

Level 1 students embarked on an exciting design challenge to create a modern, sustainable floating house using Minecraft Education. As part of their exploration, they studied the Modern Design Era, focusing on its aesthetics and principles. Each student researched two influential modernist designers and incorporated elements from Māori design, including traditional shapes, patterns, forms, and colours, into one of their three concept ideas. Sustainability was a key focus, with students integrating features such as solar panels, green roofs, rainwater tanks, triple-glazed windows, wind turbines, and biophilic design to enhance their architectural concepts. In addition, they designed a SMART sustainable desk lamp, applying eco-conscious thinking to everyday products.

Level 2 students designed modern, sustainable museums, focusing on modernist architecture, aesthetics, and sustainability. They researched two key architects and explored Māori design principles to enrich their concepts. Sustainable features, including solar panels, green roofs, rainwater systems, triple-glazed windows, wind turbines, biomimicry, and biophilic design, were integrated. Students also developed SMART desk lamp concepts inspired by Bauhaus, combining minimalist style with functionality.

Level 3 students studied modernist architecture, analysing the work of two to three key architects with a focus on style, materials, and sustainable design principles, including passive solar and biophilic design. They designed high-tech, sustainable tiny houses featuring smart home technology and created desk lamp mockups inspired by Bauhaus and modernist aesthetics, testing for ergonomics and usability.



Robotics programs in secondary schools are shaping the next generation of innovators by combining fun, creativity, and learning in STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math). We have successfully engaged Year 10 and 11 students using the Edison Robot. It offers a great introduction to robotics, using simple block or Scratch-based coding. With capabilities like line-following and obstacle avoidance, Edison makes it easy for beginners to understand core robotics concepts in a fun, hands-on way.

Robotics using LEGO Mindstorms NXT offers more advanced building and programming with sensors and motors, using graphical or text-based coding like Python. This encourages problem-solving and deeper robotics skills.

This experience gave the Drama students a real-world context to apply their learning to and was a big success. The Year 11 students always perform crew roles in the showcase, which not only gives them a sneak peek into the show they will perform in the following year but also helps them make important connections with other students they will work with in the future.

Year 10/11 students enjoyed a workshop from Massive Theatre Company in Term Two and learned a lot about devising their own work and using physical theatre to tell stories. We had the pleasure of doing a workshop with a visiting Japanese school in Term Two as well, and really enjoyed playing drama games with them, as well as sharing some of their culture with us.

The junior Drama classes have had a great year of learning with their teachers, Mrs. Mitchell and Mr. Kemp. They explored NZ theatre, devising, melodrama, and worked on improvisation and character development.

Drama is a creative way to learn about the world by stepping into other people's shoes.

Japanese

This year, our Japanese classes had many exciting opportunities to interact with students from Japan. At the start of the year, the Year 11 Japanese class enjoyed playing Kendama with visiting Japanese students. They also cooked Gyoza dumplings, played the Watermelon Smash game, and the Daruma-san ga koronda game. These activities weren't just fun; they also helped students prepare for their NCEA Level 1 assessments. They wrote about their experiences for their Writing Assessment and spoke about them in their Conversation Assessment. The national curriculum for languages encourages real communication with native speakers, and these activities gave our students that valuable experience.

Later in the year, our Year 9 and 10 classes welcomed students from Koga Junior High in Japan, who were touring New Zealand. Since they were about the same age, they quickly connected by introducing themselves in Japanese and showing off what they had learned. Together, they played games such as Chinese Whispers and Colour/Animal Basket. In the Year 10 class, the Koga students taught our students a version of the Japanese game Fruit Basket, called Colour Basket. They couldn't explain it in English, so they used gestures and demonstrations instead. Some of our students figured out the rules and explained them to their classmates. Through this experience, both groups realised how important learning each other's language is for real communication.

Throughout the year, the Year 9 and 10 students built their vocabulary through singing, chanting, and interacting with native speakers. The 2025 Year 11 class, who loved dancing, even learned new Japanese words through music and dance. They worked hard all year to reach their academic goals and had plenty of fun along the way!

Health and P.E.

Throughout 2025, Health and Physical Education classes across Years 9 to 13 have provided students with meaningful opportunities to learn, grow, and apply skills that strengthen their overall well-being. All year levels have been guided by the Hauora model of Te Whare Tapa Whā, which recognises the balance between taha tinana (physical well-being), taha hinengaro (mental and emotional well-being), taha whānau (social well-being), and taha wairua (spiritual well-being).


This year, we introduced the Year 10 Health programme, offering a strong link between the Year 9 learning and creating a clear pathway into NCEA Level 1 Health. An important part of our Health programme is the emphasis on project-based learning. An example of this was Year 11 Health students planning our Pink Shirt Day alongside the Year 13 Spirit Leaders, providing further opportunities for students to make a real impact in promoting well-being across our school.

Physical Education across all year levels allowed students to enjoy and develop teamwork and movement skills in a wide range of movement contexts. Junior classes have developed a strong foundation in understanding movement in physical activity, exploring how taha whānau can be strengthened through collaboration and supporting peers in physical challenges. Emphasis has been placed on extending individual and group fitness, allowing students to build resilience and self-management skills. These experiences highlighted taha tinana and the link between personal effort, goal setting, and long-term well-being. Senior classes have built on these foundations with a more analytical focus through teamwork, leadership, and strategy. Students have had the opportunity to apply their learning to challenging opportunities such as the Year 11 Hyrox doubles competition, Year 12 classes participating in an outdoor camp at Kauaeranga Valley, and Year 13 students mountain biking the Timber Trail, as well as competing in the Tough Guy and Gal challenge.

By embedding Te Whare Tapa Whā into our classes, students are continually reminded that Health and Physical Education are about balance, connection, and lifelong learning.

We are proud of the growth our students have shown this year, both in practical sessions and in the classroom, and we look forward to continuing to enhance this further in 2026.

Agriculture and Horticulture

It's been another exciting year in the Agriculture and Horticulture department, with students from Year 9 through to Year 13 continuing to grow their knowledge, confidence, and practical skills in real-world contexts. Across all year levels, the focus remains on authentic experiences that connect learning to New Zealand's primary industries. We've also welcomed two new teachers to the team this year. Ms. McMillan and Ms. Peters have done a great job supporting students both in the classroom and out on the farm, and we're glad to have them on board.

Year 9 students continued their introduction to agriculture and horticulture by raising chickens from day-old chicks. This hands-on project taught them about animal care, responsibility, and the routines of livestock management. They've also been introduced to the basics of plant and animal science as they build a foundation in agriculture and horticulture.

Year 10 students gained a broad introduction to both animal and plant-based agriculture, alongside developing livestock knowledge with calves and sheep on the farm. They worked on horticulture projects such as berry gardens and propagating roses and grapevines. These activities highlighted the wide range of career pathways in the primary industries.

Year 11 studies included plant life processes through tomato growing and a study of land use with an insightful visit to a local dairy farm. In Term 3, the emphasis shifted to preparing for their external exam, which covers the environmental impacts of agriculture and how sustainability can be integrated into farm management.

Year 12 expanded into two classes this year, each following more flexible programs to suit student interests. Students were involved in a wide mix of horticulture, livestock care, and practical activities such as fencing. These experiences have given them valuable real-world skills that will serve them well in future pathways.

Year 13 students explored the kiwifruit industry, investigated lamb meat attributes, and studied sustainability in the ag/hort sector. A highlight was their trip to Otiwhiti Station and Massey University, where they gained hands-on experience in a high-country farming environment, spent time in university labs, toured farms, and stayed at the Rugby Institute.

Clash of the Colleges:
Our students again competed proudly at the Clash of the Colleges. The four senior teams all placed in the top ten, including 1st, 2nd, 4th, and the junior team placed 2nd.

It's been a year of growth, achievement, and opportunity. Looking ahead, we're excited to offer Horticulture as a stand-alone subject at Years 11 and 12 in 2026, providing even more choice for students.


