We are currently right in the middle of celebration season. Last night we held our Arts and Cultural Awards Evening and last week we had our Sports Prizegiving where Morrinsville local Shanaye Tissingh was our guest speaker. Tucked in between these two events we held our Service Assembly where we recognized all of those students who had provided service to the school in many

the most academically capable groups that we have had through Morrinsville College in recent times. The competition for these two awards has been fierce and evidence of this can be seen in the list of scholarship winners from all of the universities across New Zealand which is listed later in this newsletter. This is the largest group of scholarship winners that we have recorded and there are still some yet to be announced.

Earlier in the week the latest round of NCEA Literacy and Numeracy exam results were released. These exam results have produced the best statistics that we have seen since the Literacy and Numeracy exams were introduced several years ago. They have increased by over 25% in some cases. The numbers are now better than under the old system of assessment. Amongst all of the celebrations and prizegivings, this could easily go unnoticed, but it is probably the strongest indicator of academic growth at Morrinsville College and something that our staff are very proud of.


