Tyler Trust Award

I am very pleased to announce that Ahmed Al Suleiman, who was named Dux at our Senior Prizegiving Ceremony late last year, has won the Tyler Trust Award for 2023. This award recognises the top achiever in NCEA Level 3 once all of the external results are confirmed. Ahmed amassed 71 Level 3 credits across a range of subjects which included



Physics, Mathematics with Statistics, English, Biology and Chemistry. This was on top of his Excellence endorsements at Level 1 and Level 2 in previous years. Ahmed was amongst a group of high-performing students last year and 13% of his cohort also achieved an Excellence endorsement which matched the national average and was well above schools of a similar economic equity standing. The Tyler Trust was established many years ago by the late Nerissa Minnie Tyler, an ex-staff member, to award Morrinsville College's top academic Year 13 student with a substantial amount of money. This money represents the interest earned in 2023 from the Tyler Trust. This year Ahmed will be starting his Health Sciences degree at Otago University like a number of students who have left





over the past two weeks to begin their studies at a wide range of tertiary providers and universities across New Zealand.

received awards as the top-performing students in NCEA Level 1 and Level 2. They both received Board of Trustees' awards at the school assembly last week.
